

Imagine meeting a stranger, a fellow traveler, who butts into the conversation you're having with your friend. The two disciples in today's Gospel are heading to Emmaus, seven miles away from Jerusalem, heartbroken and disillusioned. It's the day of Jesus' resurrection, but no one knew it when these two set out on their journey, maybe going home to resume their pre-Jesus lives because it seemed as if everything was over.

In the middle of trying to make sense of the tragedy, some eavesdropping guy asks them about their troubles. After telling their story, the disciples are amazed to find this stranger able to piece together the fragments of the broken image of their master using scripture as the glue. Then it happens—at dinner they recognize Jesus in the breaking of bread, just before he vanishes. With their hearts burning with love and inspiration, they run back to Jerusalem—at night—to tell the others their new story.

THE STRANGER/SHEPHERD

The stranger in this story who turns out to be Jesus is reminiscent of the Gospel images of Jesus as the Good

Shepherd. He seeks out his "lost sheep" who have strayed from the faith community, and the experience of the risen Lord transforms them into perhaps the very first evangelists, sharing their Good News with their friends back in Jerusalem.

Are we transformed by the time we leave Mass? We should be! Our hearts should be burning within us from our experience of Jesus in word and sacrament. Yet how often life breaks our heart and clouds our mind! We stumble toward our own Emmaus, unaware that Jesus is with us. We are privileged to experience Jesus in every Eucharist through the breaking open of scripture and by the breaking of the bread. Like the disciples of the story, that transforming experience can compel us to go forth and tell everyone the Good News.

GOD'S PLAN

Saint Peter speaks to us twice today. In the first reading, we hear an excerpt from his sermon on Pentecost; in the second, part of his first letter. Once a frightened, uneducated fisherman who often said just the wrong thing, now Peter is speaking what he knows to be true. Everything Jesus had said now makes sense. His death and rising were all part of God's plan, and our faith and hope can be centered on God.

Today's Gospel tells the story of Jesus' walk to Emmaus with two of the disciples. Frightened, sad, and confused, the two of them don't recognize Jesus, who tells them what we heard Peter say above: All this had to happen as part of God's plan. In the end, these disciples recognize Jesus as we are to recognize him—in the breaking of the bread.

Please pray for these children especially on Sunday, that they will be rescued; placed with caring people; their minds and bodies can heal, and that they can find hope. Following my letter there are several pages of information and prayers.

We unquestionably have the greatest parishioners in the Diocese of Tyler. I sincerely appreciate your efforts in keeping up with your contributions during these difficult days. Word has it that many parishioners are calling to check in with one another, dropping off a home cooked meal on their front porch, making masks, donating food, grocery & prescription drop offs, etc.

Speaking of food donations during these hard times if anyone knows of a family or families having a tough time with food. Please call or email Bob Mailliard at 903-769-3963 or theduckdude@att.net. Provide the name, address, phone # and how many adults & children are living in that home. If you would like to make can or boxed food donations towards our food pantry call or email Bob.

Through the COVID-19, would you like to attend my private Mass during the weekdays Tuesday through Friday at 8:00am? All you have to do is call me by 8:00pm the night before, you would like to attend Mass and let me know the # of people coming with you. I cannot have more than 10 people including myself, remember we have to practice safe distancing in church 6 feet apart from each other.

Confessions, Tues., Apr. 28th; Wed., Apr. 29th; and Thurs., Apr. 30th from 9:00—10:30am. Confessions rain or shine, cold or hot weather. I will be parked in front of the double glass doors that you enter into the Narthex, under the overhang, seated in my front seat of my car. Please drive up and park your vehicle 6 feet from my vehicle and stay in your vehicle. Roll your window down, turn motor off and start your confession. After, your confession, you may drive around to our meditation garden, to say your penance.

I hope these past weeks our resources we share with you have helped. Just remember we cannot gather for our sacred, sacrificial banquet, the Eucharist, we must keep Sunday, the Lord's Day, holy through prayer. You are especially invited to reflect on the daily Mass scriptures (http://usccb.org/), make a spiritual communion (see below), and even consider watching Mass which is available on our diocesan web site: https://www.dioceseoftyler.org/en/ and https://stphilipinstitute.org/ or EWTN Channel on tv. If you have a cell phone you can add the Laudate app for daily readings and prayers, etc.

Please call me if you need help or you just need to talk to someone. I'm always available to each and everyone of you.

An Act of Spiritual Communion

Guidance for Churches Under Stay-at-Home/Shelter-in-Place-Orders Fr. Mike is expected to fully observe the local orders for Wood County

- 1. Chancery and Parish Office closed. You may call and leave a message on the office # 903-769-3235 and Bridget will be checking messages through out the day and will return your call as soon as possible. Or, call Fr. Mike cell# 903-490-3883 and leave a message. You may also, send an email to Bridget's personal email address Bridgetarich@Live.com
- 2. **Baptisms** are suspended. Where there is a real danger of death, call Fr. Mike 903-490-3883.
- 3. <u>Funerals</u> are suspended. Call Fr. Mike's cell# 903-490-3883 and he will coordinate with family and funeral directors. Especially, when the family request the rites proper to funerals. Graveside services may be still permitted, depending on our local provisions and provided those who attend observe proper social distancing.
- 4. Fr. Mike will continue to celebrate private Mass except on Saturday and Monday. Along with Mass Fr. will fulfill Mass Intentions.
- 5. <u>Confessions</u> are every Tues., Wed., and Thurs., from 9:00—10:30am (see my letter to parishioners for details)

 Where the individual faithful find themselves in the painful impossibility of receiving sacramental absolution, it should be remembered that perfect contrition, coming from the love of God, beloved above all things, expressed by a sincere request for forgiveness (that which the penitent is at present able to express) and accompanied by the firm resolution to have re course, as soon as possible, to sacramental confession, obtains forgiveness of sins, even mortal ones (cf. CCC, no. 1452).
- 6. Anointing of the Sick for those in dire need of the sacrament Fr. Mike will performed the sacrament on your front porch of your home. Call him on his cell 903-490-3883.

Update on Measures to Keep the Diocese of Tyler Safe: April 1

On March 17, 2020, I issued a decree suspending the public celebration of Mass and enacting other measures in support of the effort to keep our communities safe and prevent the spread of the coronavirus disease. I also noted that I would provide a brief, general update to the diocese on April 1.

Because we must continue to remain isolated and do our part to slow the spread of this terrible disease, and following the guidelines and orders from our local, state, and national leaders, the measures taken in the March 17 decree remain in effect until further notice.

All of our priests feel a great sorrow that our communities cannot be together for our public worship, especially for the special celebrations of the Lord's passion, death, and resurrection during Holy Week. Yet, we know that on Easter morning, in our homes, we will celebrate Christ's victory over sin and death and that this is our source of joy even now.

Please continue to be comforted knowing that priests here in the diocese are praying for you and celebrating Mass for the praise and glory of God's name, for our good, and the good of all his holy Church.

Let us remain united in the love of Jesus, praying for the sick, the lonely, and for those who are working to keep our communities safe, particularly the doctors, nurses, and other medical professionals.

Finally, I once again strongly encourage everyone in the Diocese of Tyler to listen to and follow the directions of our state and local authorities. Our president has told us that tough days are ahead. It is our behaviors that will change the course of this pandemic. Whether you are sick or not, please stay in your homes except for essential needs. In doing this, combined with our prayers, we will be helping to bring this crisis to an end so that we can once again come together.



When we give Mary the honor that's due to her, we give glory to God who created her. And imagine how happy that makes Jesus!



In Fatima, Portugal, Mary appeared to three kids named Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco with an important message for the world to turn away from sin and back to Jesus.

Sometimes Mary gives us special reminders too. She appeared to Catherine Labouré, asking her to create a special medal. Nowadays, many people wear the Miraculous Medal to show they belong to God. Another time, Mary offered a small piece of cloth tied to a string, called a **scapular**, which some people wear as a reminder to live as Mary and Jesus lived.



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
